Develop a Theology of Work

David: God wants us to think theologically; to ask God, how do you want us to view the meaning of work and the character of work?

7 recommendations for how to re-form our view of work life and the workplace to help our members find meaning.

- 1. Acquire a solid biblical view of work.
- 2. Study work, business, and economics.
- 3. Visit the workplaces of members of your congregation.
- 4. Pray for your members' work.
- 5. Preach and teach the workplace lessons whenever they arise in Scripture.
- 6. Commission and affirm members for their work
- 7. Educate

"We need to be building up our people so that they understand how to do their work as Christ-followers...Unless we address people's work, they'll think my pastor doesn't care about my work, they don't understand it, or they don't approve of it. I don't think that's the message we want to be sending."

Post-pandemic Identity Crisis

Denise: For too long people have tried to drive their identity, their purpose, and their meaning from work. During the pandemic when work was so disrupted, and people's lives were so disrupted we realized that that's not right. As Christians we know that we need to drive our identity from Christ. Therefore, our work needs to be an expression of that identity and a way we live out that identity. People are not hearing this message from the church.

Now's the time for us to introduce a healthy, God-honoring, life-giving perspective of work that helps them put it all into context and hopefully motivates them to re-engage with the workplace in a healthier way.

"If we don't talk in the church about our identity as people who work, then we're just thinking about work in a worldly way, so we don't have a Godly way to think, a positive way, to think about our identity as people who work." - Andrew Hoffman

Work and Rest

David: God is not the God who works all the time and doesn't rest. No, He sets us a model. We need to have Sabbath where we worship, hang out, and play.

Make Connections

Connections to others:

Denise: We have to help people make connections. It's hard work, but once you do it, there's so much fruit that comes from it.

Connections to our ministry:

Question: How do we want to equip people to do things differently?

Answer: Through a sermon, course, or seminar.

Connections in the workplace:

Take time to meet with your members in their workplace.

Andrew: When you do something proactive like, Bring your pastor to work it really is stepping into that space. We need to fortify the healthy and help people to take it to the next level in their walk with Jesus.

"The amount of influence that you have on the world is remarkable. The people who are sitting in your pews are the folks who are shaping our culture, our technology, the way we are living our lives. We have this awesome opportunity to build them up as Christ-followers who have this gospel inspired vision of work and to be able to glorify God in their work. Is the next Mark Zuckerberg sitting in your pew? Wouldn't you want to build them up to be the kind of faithful servant leader that we know God is calling them to be." - Denise Lee Yohn
